
When you think about it, the best things about local communities didn't just happen – they were made to happen – by energetic and committed people with a belief in each other and a shared idea of what they could achieve.



what next for Darlington?

Back in April 2014 the community of Darlington came together to decide upon the priorities for the township's Community Plan, which was prepared as part of the Building Stronger Corangamite Communities initiative.

People voted on the ideas identified through a Town Survey, to settle on a tenyear plan with 16 priorities. These 16 project ideas that made up the Darlington Community Plan 2014 – 2024 were clustered around six key topics.



CLEAN UP THE TOWN

Improving the poor and unkempt appearance of the town was identified as the highest priority by the Darlington community. This was about cleaning up rubbish and cutting long grass (1), exploring the idea of organising a garbage collection service for the town (14), enforcing existing regulations to do with building regulations and fire hazards (15), as well as planting more street trees and watering them until established (16).

EXPERIENCING DARLINGTON

This involved creating a picnic spot down on Nugget's Flat (4) and putting up a noticeboard pointing out historic sites and walking tracks around town (4), including the construction of a walking track along the Creek (11).

RECREATION RESERVE UPGRADES

There were three main ideas centred on the Speedway/ Recreation Reserve. The first was about building new toilets (3), the second about altering the entry road to the Speedway to make it safer (5) and the third to provide camping facilities at the reserve (12) which included facilities associated with the upgraded toilets.

REOPENING THE ELEPHANT BRIDGE HOTEL

While it was recognised that achieving this priority would rely upon private business investment, reopening the Pub (7) was a high ranking community priority.

DARLINGTON HALL

Another cluster of ideas centred on assuring a future for Darlington's historic Mechanics Institute Hall. This involved assembling funding for the Hall (8) for repairs and improvements, and organising a program of community get-togethers (10) to make sure that it is well-used, and therefore worthy of investment.

TOWN SERVICES

Improving the town water supply (6), maintaining the Darlington CFA presence (9), and reducing the speed limit through town to 60 kilometres (13) are all ideas that involve the intervention of the State Government and its instrumentalities. The alignment of the Speedway entry road (5) also fits into this category.



It is amazing what the community of Darlington has been able to achieve over the past five years, in partnership with Corangamite Shire.

Back in 2014 the Pub was closed. There was little movement to disturb the bats in the Mechanics Institute Hall, which had been seldom used for many years. The bills were being paid then by a dedicated local person – out of her own pocket. The Hall didn't appear to have much of a future and there was talk amongst the Committee (which met once every three years) that it would have to be sold.

IMPROVING THE PRESENTATION OF THE TOWN

From 2014 the Darlington community has come together for working bees to clean up and beautify the town. Roundabouts were weeded, covered with mulch and colourful gazanias planted out. The Nugget's Flat picnic area was established, with BBQ, seating and tree-planting. The area around the old bridge abutments was cleared, grass areas regularly mowed, and new street trees planted. Work has commenced on a short walking track along the Creek to a platypus viewing platform.

WORK ON THE HALL

An important priority the Darlington community set to work on was to rejuvenate the Mechanics Institute Hall. The interior of the Hall has been painted, the roof repaired, toilets fixed and tank water connected. Ramps and trestles have been purchased, along with a commercial fridge, coffee machine and instant hot water. An external aerial is installed and large signs erected outside announcing up-coming events. The Peace Bell has been restored, its commemorative plaque renewed and a new flagpole erected.

COMMUNITY EVENTS

The extensive restoration, refurbishment and reopening of the historic Elephant Bridge Hotel in 2015 was an exciting event for the people of Darlington and district, and the Pub quickly resumed its role as a gathering point for the local community as well as a destination for people from nearby towns as well as the travelling public on the Hamilton Highway. The other key institution in Darlington is the Mechanics Institute Hall, which now hosts the Darlington Art Group, regular bush dances and film nights. It has been the venue for several events celebrating Darlington's history, and these have attracted audiences of up to 150 interested participants.
